Mallorey said she thinks next year’s trends will consist of yet more preppy, simplistic styles.

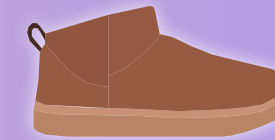

Mallorey’s sister Marissa Cheslock, a Fashion Design major at University of Cincinnati, said fashion trends recycle themselves throughout the years, especially with prom dresses.

“All fashion trends are cyclical. Five years ago, the trendiest prom dress was blinged out in sequins and jewels from head to toe. While that may not be the most popular choice in 2023, you never know when you might see those come back,” Marissa said. “I remember looking through my mom’s old scrapbooks from high school and seeing her and her friends’ school dance dresses from the late ‘80s to early ‘90s; I noticed a lot of similarities between those styles and silhouettes from 30-plus years ago to the dresses that are popular now. Of course there are modernized fabrics and trims and other details, but everything comes back around in the end.”

Mallorey said she went a more untraditional route when looking for a dress.

“I didn’t want to go through the whole, ‘I love the dress, but not the color’ and vice versa when looking for a prom dress. I have an older sister in college who is majoring in fashion, and so I asked her to make my dress,” Mallorey said. “Having my dress made by my sister was honestly really nice. I was able to control every aspect of the dress from color and fabric to the thickness of the straps and the dress was made to my measurements.”

Marissa said making Mallorey’s dress was a pleasure and handmade prom dresses really stand out.

She said, “I love the idea of handmade prom dresses. I made my own in 2021, and also have made most of my outfits for other formal occasions. It always feels special to be wearing, or to see somebody else wearing, something that nobody else is, and that I had a part in making.”

Junior Kaiya Lustig, a fashion enthusiast, said she

also acquired her dress through an unorthodox method.

“I bought my prom dresses secondhand, and they were vintage. I really like sleeves, and so both of my dresses have interesting sleeves, which I feel is less common,” Lustig said. “I think I’ve been seeing a lot more individualized style too, rather than just straight up trends. People wear what they like; people wear what they want to wear.”

Mallorey and Lustig are not alone. According to *Insider*, seeking alternate methods of acquiring prom dresses—such as handmaking and thrifting—is becoming a trend in adolescents. Because of this recirculating of older dresses and styles, there is a wider range of styles adorned by those attending prom this year. Whilst before, glitter and sequins ruled the universe of prom, there is much more variety now.

Mallorey said she appreciates the tiered dress trend that has resurfaced from the mid 1800s.

“I really like the tiered dresses that I’ve been seeing so much more of lately. I’ve seen a ton of tiered dresses with gathers, tulle and slits and I think they all look really good,” Mallorey said.

In contrast to Mallorey, Lustig said she is a fan of the floral patterns that have circled from the mid 1900s.

“My favorite trend is definitely the floral prom dresses, or just any pattern in general,” Lustig said. “Any dresses that have print on it, or just something actually going on, I’m into.”

Rather than following trends, Lustig said she prefers to stand out in a crowd, and follows an eclectic sense of style.

“If you want to stand out more, buying a second hand dress is really helpful. If you buy vintage, it’s unlikely you will end up with anyone with the same dress as you,” Lustig said. “But really, just wear what you want. Prom isn’t that deep, and it’s okay if you want to be different or follow trends.”

Transition to Maturity



Embracing, celebrating transition to maturity

The transition from childhood to maturity is a complex process that is often portrayed by the media in a simplistic way. In my opinion, to help combat this, I personally don't listen to artists who are known for copyright infringement. By not supporting this act, it helps other artists everywhere have a more successful career. □

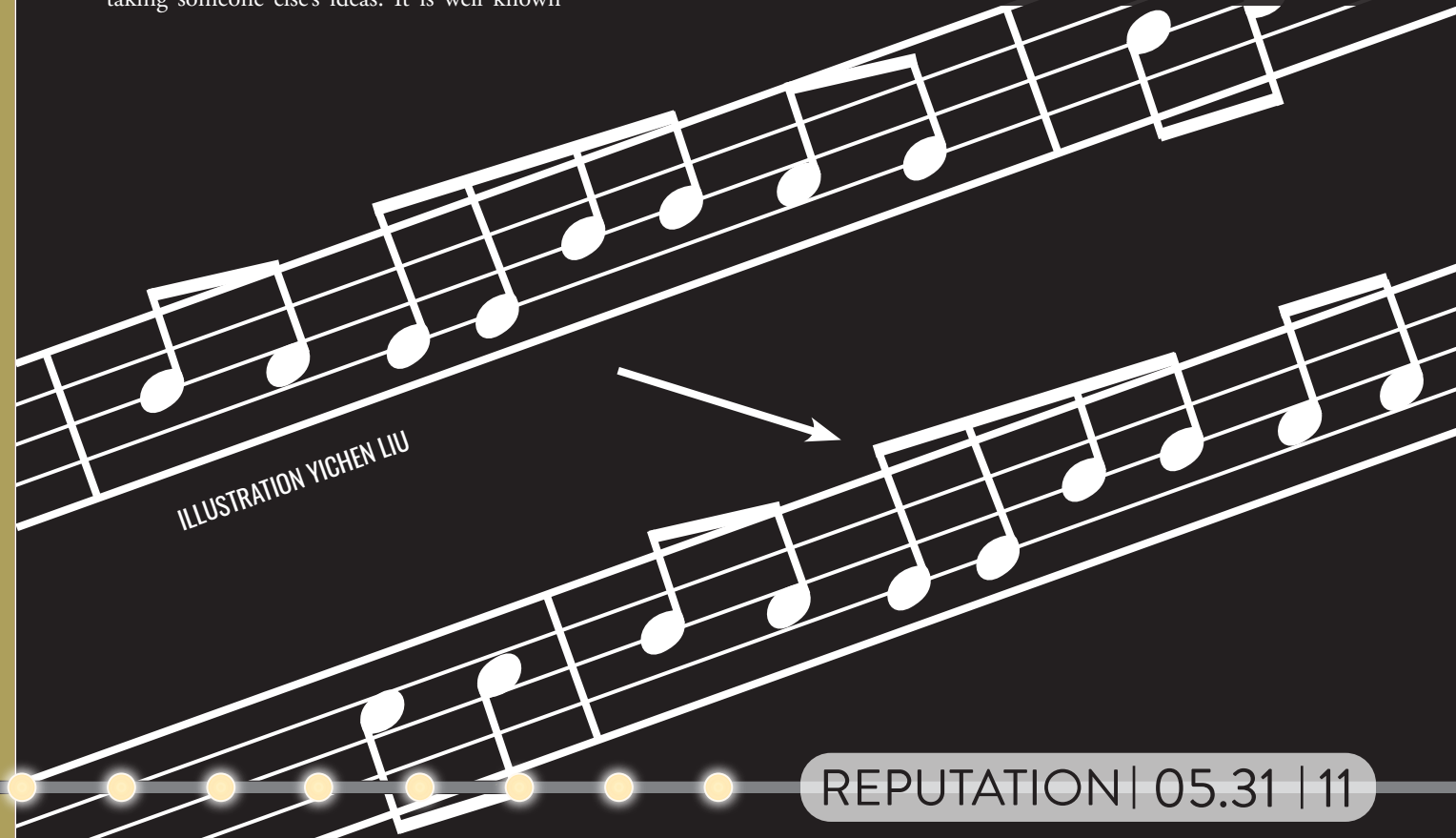

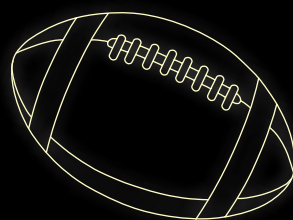
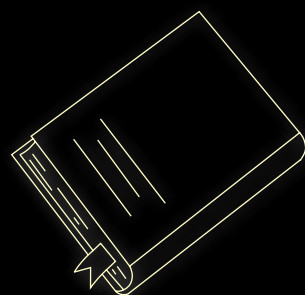
How do you best mentally prepare for a race?

Nerds are socially awkward and book smart. Jocks are rebellious and unfiltered. Popular girls are exclusive and mean. Theater kids are geeky and dramatic. Those are a few of the many cliques portrayed through the media, specifically movies such as “Mean Girls,” “The Outsiders” and “Sixteen Candles.” The accuracy of the portrayal of cliques in the media is questionable. Many times, the way the cliques are shown throughout the media are, for one, exaggerated and largely based on inaccurate generalizations.

Most times the media shows a clear, distinct line between the popular kids, the geeks, the nerds and the jocks. For example, in various movies the cliques are shown to be separated in a cafeteria setting and you would only be able to sit with a certain group if you fell into that group’s criteria. This propagates the idea that an individual can only inherently fall into one group and there is no possible way someone can be a nerd and a jock.

Teens should stop engaging in large age-gap relationships

When our beloved Taylor Swift was just 19 years old, she was speculated to be in a short-lived relationship with John Mayer, 32 years old at the time. Then, when she was just turning 21, she and Jake Gyllenhaal, age 30 at the time, also had a romantic relationship going on. Although these 13- and 9-year age gaps inspired some masterpieces, including “Would’ve, Could’ve, Should’ve” and “All Too Well,” these songs were based off of the traumas of the age gaps and the manipulation that came with them. Teenagers and young adults should be more aware of the risks while dating an older individual, and the majority of age-gap-prominent relationships should come to an end.

Often, I hear about seniors dating freshmen, and sophomores dating college-age students. Although the age gap between these students is only around 3-4 years, as a teenager, maturity levels are the real issue in these slight age gaps. A freshman is not going to have the same level of maturity as someone 4 years older than them. Throughout high school, the mind grows so much, experiences cause changes within individuals and different grades have different priorities. While seniors are planning for college and careers, freshmen just got out of middle school and are still figuring out their way around the triangular Freshman Center.

Also, relationships like this often lead to the older significant other to prey on the younger and more vulnerable one. The older person probably has more experience with relationships than the younger one; therefore, the younger one follows their lead and almost never questions what is going on. Almost always, there is a sense of fake

trust going on from the younger individual to the older individual. This can lead to manipulation, grooming, abuse and regret. However, in Indiana, the legal consent age is 16, meaning that it is illegal for individuals over the age of 18 to engage in sexual activity with someone younger than 16. When age-gap relationships cross this line, not only are they inappropriate, but they’re also illegal.

Like Swift said, “I was never good at telling jokes/But the punchline goes/’I’ll get older but your lovers stay my age” in “All Too Well (10 Minute Version) [Taylor’s Version]”. As an example, Gyllenhaal is still loving on younger girls and his current girlfriend, Jeanne Cadieu, is only 27 while he is now 42. Swift may have learned her lesson the hard way with dating older men, but the men still carry on with their repetitive, manipulative actions. All in

all, young teens need to avoid putting their full trust in older teens, and older teens need to stop their manipulative relationships with younger teens. ^A

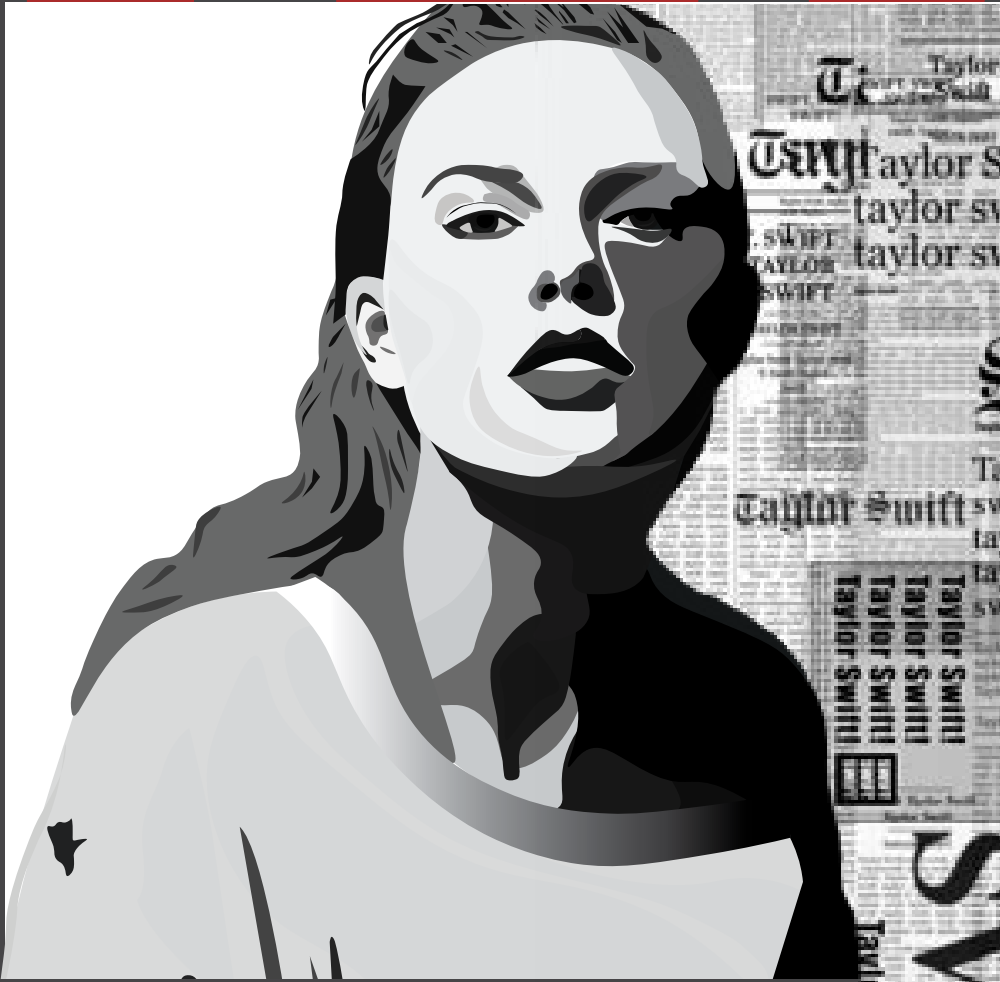

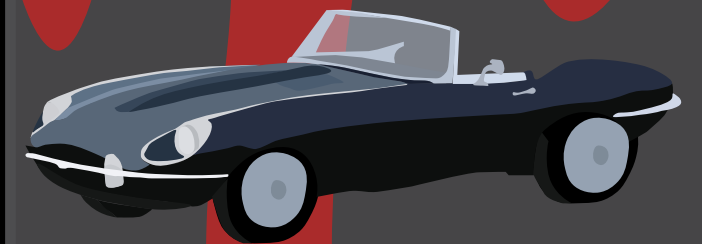

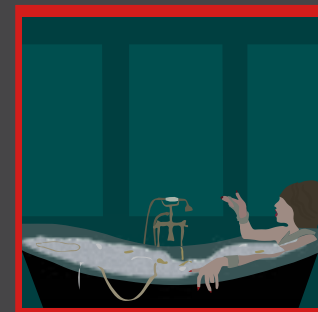
